 Long term projects, can take many years
 Most gratifying, despite challenges

HOW DID WE DO IT?

Develop Substance
 Organize Community
 Deliver the Right Message
 Analyze Opponents
 Develop, Deploy, Revisit Strategy



DEVELOP SUBSTANCE

• What do you want to change and why?

• What's broken?

• How do you propose to fix it?

•KEY: Make sure the fix solves what's broken



ORGANIZE COMMUNITY

• Gather and Assess Community

• Identify:

- o strengths/weaknesses/relationships
- o Politics/History between groups
- o advocates and opponents within the Legislature
- If past failure, what has gone wrong?
- What role should people play, including you? (lead, follow, get out of way)

• KEY: Are we all on the same page?



DELIVER THE RIGHT MESSAGE

- Be sensitive to and know your audience
- Who should deliver the message? (Grassroots vs. grasstops)
- Different messages for different perspectives
- Thoughts on form letters vs. personalized testimony
- When and to who? (Public hearings vs. meetings)
- Common pitfalls (passionate vs. abrasive)





ANALYZE OPPONENTS

•Who are they (the ones you see, and the ones you don't)

• Counteracting their messages

• Do you have opponents on your side?



DEVELOP, DEPLOY, REVISIT STRATEGY

• Keep community informed • Keep community motivated • Best use of available resources (people, legislative champions, media, etc) • Where are you in the process? • What are opponents doing? • READ every version of the bill • KEY: Build momentum, and be ready to react and shift gears



NUTS AND BOLTS

• Challenges of legislative process for the public

- To pass a bill, you need to know process in and out
 - Who are key leaders (or staff) on your issue?
 - What are key deadlines?
 - Where are the pressure points?

NUTS AND BOLTS

- Who is your LEAD chair ?
 - First subject matter committee chair
 - Money committee chairs
- Key milestones -
 - Opening Day-3rd Wednesday in January
 - Bill introduction cut-off
 - 1st Cross-over
 - 2nd Cross-over
 - Conference Committee
 - Adjournment (60 legislative days)
 - Last Day for Governor to Veto Bills



IMPROVING YOUR EFFECTIVENESS

- Invest in relationships and community; it will pay off when you least expect it
 Get to know key legislators
- Educate before you advocate



Be humble, ask rather than tell
 Listening is communication
 Be patient, timing is everything
